13.	<u>Jigoku</u> – Japanese Buddhism concept of "hell"
14.	<u>Lotus Sutra</u> – one of the most important religious texts of the Mahayana Buddhist traditions, especially in Japan.
15.	<u>Jodo-shinsha</u> = "True Pure Land" – Japan's largest Buddhist sect. Its central concept is centered on a devotee's personal relationship with the deity, Amida.
16.	Nichiren-shu (shoshu) – A Japanese Buddhist sect centered around the chanting of the phrase "daimoku" in reference to the Fith Lotus Sutra.
17.	torii – a gateway (structure) that demarcates sacred space from profane at a Shinto
